The Agriculture in the Classroom program is designed to promote "agriculture literacy" -- a greater awareness, understanding and appreciation of agriculture's influence on our lives -- to students throughout the state of Tennessee.

Through this program, classroom instructors have an opportunity to participate in the Agriculture Ambassador Teacher Network and numerous Teacher Training Seminars. From this participation, educational resource materials are available to enhance classroom studies and presentations and to supplement the basic school curriculum. In addition to these enhancement materials, the AITC program also offers an "Outdoor Classroom" matching grant and training program for schools.

To get a true "hands-on" experience of agriculture, many county Farm Bureaus throughouthe state, along with other cooperative groups, sponsor local Farm Day tours. These tours give students a realistic perspective of farm life. Participants learn that farmers are effective environmental stewards and that an abundant, safe, reasonably - priced food supply is vital to our economy and society.
