Early years continued

- He lived in the U.S his whole life, although he was drafted in the army in
 World War 2 and was sent to Europe. After the war he returned to Minnesota
- His nickname as a kid was "Sparky" after Sparkplug, the horse in Barney comic strip
- The Schulz family moved from Minneapolis to a rented apartment at 1662
 James Avenue in St. Paul, which was much closer to Carl's business his father
- In 1929, the Schulz family packed up their 1928 Ford and traveled across the country to live in small town Needles, California. Carl, Dena and Charles Schulz rented a house at 503 Palm Way later on they moved to Sebastopol, California



- He attended kindergarten at the Mattocks School on James Avenue, but he
 moved so he later he was enrolled at in Richards Gordon Elementary School
 on Dayton Avenue in St. Paul and he attended this school through grade 8.
- At this school in St. Paul, Minnesota, he was allowed to skip two grades.



Adult-Early years



- He stayed in california for a while and built his first studio, after he built the studio he worked from there. His father died when he visited him, a year later his studio burned down
- He then moved to Santa Rosa, California

- He worked alone but had the support of his family
- He was inspired at a young age, it all started when him and his father would read sunday funny papers every week.
- This is when he became fan of E.C Segar's Thimble Theatre they featured Popeye.
- That is what spiked his interest into cartoonists



Personal life

- Charles had two wives, his first wife goes by the name of Joyce Halverson
- Joyce had a child before she met charles, her name is Meredith, Eventually charles adopted her as his own
- They had four named Charles Jr-called Monte, Craig, Amy Johnson, and Jill
 Schulz Transki
- He got a divorce in December 1922, later he remarried Jeannie Clyde she remained his wife for the rest of his life
- His kids today ages are Meredith Hodges 70 years old ,Monte Schulz 69
 years old,Jill Schulz 62 years old,Craig Schulz 57 years old, and finally Amy
 schulz 65 years old

First works of art

- Peanuts comic strip made him famous and a well known cartoonist
- His comic strip is his first noted art, at first his work wasn't popular, but he managed to sell it to United Feature Syndicate
- His comic was called "Li'l Folks" but it eventually got changed to "Peanuts" due to worries of potential copyright.
- This is when Peanuts became very popular and a successful creation
- His comic the character called Snoopy this name he wanted to actually call him "Sniffy"



- He used his peanuts art strips to stand up for civil rights
- Mainly his comic strips were popular because they were in the public's be interest
- He would include many of the movements that happpened in his life in his comic, he support many different ones mainly civil rights




Dear Mrs. Glickman:






